

All the very best, and good luck in the postal auction if you are bidding, **Daniel.** 

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

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# **A Curiosity Of Edinburgh Hallmarking**

Before the introduction of the combined stub at Edinburgh in the early nineteenth century, the punches were all struck individually. This could inevitably have led to the possibility of striking one or more of the hallmarks with a wrong orientation.

Two such examples are illustrated here. The first spoon is dated 1791 (Fig. 1) where the thistle mark has been struck at right angles to the other hallmarks. The second of 1801 (Fig. 2) has the thistle struck upside down.

These are the only examples that I am aware of and it would be interesting if any members have seen similar 'mis-orientations' from the Edinburgh assay office.








### **Apostles During The Commonwealth**

The table shown by David M. Mitchell (Fig. 22 on p. 41 of Silversmiths in Elizabethan and Stuart London), which details the quantity of plate touched at the Assay office 1560 – 1699, makes it clear that 1640-1650 was a very bleak period. Thereafter steady recovery followed during the 1650s. Mitchell notes that some London goldsmiths "went for soldiers in the cause of parliament while others transferred their skills to armament production, or acted as provision merchants".




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### **Masked Intentions?**

I was recently able to purchase a curiosity from a friend, collector and researcher of silver. It was one of a pair of interesting 'Rococo' tablespoons and is worthy of comment.





The pair of tablespoons was purchased in 2014 by Dick Phillips of Adelaide 'by remote control' from a Sydney auction house. They were described as "A Pair of George III Sterling Silver Soup Spoons decorated with masks by Thomas Chawner of London 1776, 151g". No hint was given of any irregularity, and being attractive and interesting they were pursued and successfully acquired by Dick.

Upon delivery to Adelaide they were inspected and admired. However it was also noticed that there were solder marks half way along the stem of the handle. Apparently both had been cut through the stem above the hallmarks with some form of re-attachment. The ends of the spoons (with masks above some scroll-work) were presumably replacements for a plain Hanoverian (?) or some other pattern of terminal. The join was skilfully executed and hard to see – certainly it was missed by the auctioneer. The mask is integral with the replacement spoon handle (die struck) and the overall balance of the spoon visually and functionally has been retained.





This curious manoeuvre would have clearly contravened hallmarking regulations with the substantial addition of silver. Had someone indulged a momentary fantasy? Further inspection, however revealed that the perpetrator had taken the matter sufficiently seriously to have the additions regularised. Upon scrutiny, two marks – the small black letter lower case 't' and the lion passant appear discreetly hidden in the ringlets around the base of the mask. This too was missed by the auctioneer. The placement appears to have been done with skill and sensitivity. The only difficulty is in determining if the date letter refers to 1874 or 1934.


One wonders if there are other spoons, which have received similar treatment. It was clearly not a 'Sunday afternoon' or 'end of the day' exploit or whim. Had there been an entire service, thus treated, to update it from something more mundane? Are there table forks, dessert items of flatware and even possibly serving pieces in existence, all thus treated? A Finial story masked in mystery.


### **Feedback**

**Paul Dudley** writes: I recently purchased a Slip Top spoon that had been buried for many years and needed a bit of TLC as you will see. My silversmith did a remarkable job of restoring it. What makes this more interesting is the maker's mark 'RC' conjoined, as shown in Jackson, page 324, as 'CR' conjoined unascribed. My spoon also has the Fruit mark for Barnstaple in the bowl, my guess would be therefore 'RC' conjoined could possibly be for Raleigh Clapham.










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**Tony Dixon** emails: Dear Daniel, as promised, attached is a photograph of the crest on the 1791 Dublin Old English pattern tablespoon made by Michael Keating.

I am advised that the safest attribution for the crest is that it is associated with an Irish Hamilton. I had hoped it would be Abercorn, but although not impossible there is nothing on this crest that would specifically indicate Abercorn. Historically it is interesting that many Hamiltons moved from Scotland to Northern Ireland, one family attained the rank of Duke and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Duke of Abercorn was the grandfather of Princes Diana.

I hope the attribution to an Irish Hamilton will make it more attractive. (See Lot 80 in postal auction - Ed)
