



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### **The Sir Andrew Noble Disc End Spoons**

The Re-discovery of a Pair of Important Scottish Disc End spoons

In further researching the survival and varieties of pre 1700 Scottish spoons the following two spoons recently came back into view after being off the market since 1989, when last sold by How of Edinburgh. Rather than being another re-appearance of recorded items the opportunity to handle and study these has led to the re-attribution of their likely date and now places them amongst the earliest in the group of Disc End Spoons known to survive.

Originally from the famed Sir Andrew Noble Collection, these spoons are recorded in exhibitions as early as 1931 and appeared on the open market via Christie's London, Lot 101, 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> November 1943 in their 'Fine Old English Silver and Early English Spoons' Sale. Even at the height of the Second World War they were highly prized and were sold to an unknown buyer for £150, one of the highest prices of the spoon collection bettered only by a pair of Charles II Stump Top spoons, 1635 (£300), two Henry VII Sip Top spoons, 1501 (£450) and an Edward VI Apostle spoon, 1552 (£250).

While most early Scottish spoon types follow closely known and comparable patterns, whether it is with English neighbours or further a field in mainland Europe, the Disc End is without doubt the most rare within the Scottish survival. The only close comparables come from a very small group of later York made spoons known as the 'Death Head' group.

Although the York 'Death Head' group closely follows the basic outlines of Scottish Disc Ends they appear only to start after the end of their survival in Scotland with their date range between 1662 - 1678. It is not only the date range, which differentiates the two types; the decoration and original commission are extremely different, the York examples appearing to have been made as christening spoons for one family, the Scottish being a standard pattern of its time.

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


Fig. 5 - George Crawford, Edinburgh most likely 1615 – 1616

During his career George Crawford took on seven apprentices, four of whom who became freeman of the Incorporation; George Robertson (app. 1607 free 1617), Patrick Borthwick (app. 1625 free. 1642), Thomas Thomson (app. 1605 to Adam Wilson transferred app. 1609 free 1617) and William Crawford I his son (app. 1614 free 1627).

As with all early Scottish silver, work bearing Crawford's mark is rare, either as maker or Deacon, but a small number of communion cups and another Disc End spoon are recorded.

Due to the fact that Crawford was Deacon on more than one occasion and these pre-date the 1681 striking of a date letter the dating of such early Scottish silver can be tricky. It often falls to provenance from ownership and the working dates of maker and Deacon to find the likely cycle of hallmarking. In this case with Crawford as Deacon and maker it does make things a little confused.

These spoons were originally considered to be 1621-1622. What evidence of this is unknown but as with much of the dating of Scottish silver in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century it may have been seen as a safe bet to go for his middle period as Deacon. However, looking at the striking of the maker's punch and some damage seen to the Edinburgh Castle punch it now seems highly likely these spoons in fact date to his first period as Deacon in 1615-1616. This is further backed up by research into their original ownership.

The engraved initials to these spoons offer a rare insight into the original ownership. As has been much discussed before, the placement of the 'M' above the initials most likely denotes a Minister. This style of engraving is common in Scotland and various original ownerships of silver have been traced as such.

After exhaustive research through 'Fasti Ecclesiae Scoticannae' it has been impossible to find any likely candidate for the original ownership of these spoons other than Rev. Hew McGhie; he is recorded as follows:- "Presb of Kirkcudbright, Parish of Balmaghie.

1615 - Hew McGhie, son of James McGhie, Maybole; MA (Edinburgh, 30<sup>th</sup> July 1614); on the Exercise in Presb of Linlithgow 8<sup>th</sup> Feb and adm after 15<sup>th</sup> June 1615; still minister 25 Sept 1638. The date of his death is unknown. He married Janet Gordon, and had issue – Hew, apprenticed to Robert Paterson, apothecary, Edinburgh 29<sup>th</sup> March 1643; Alexander; Agnes (marr cont 26<sup>th</sup> April 1639 John Arnot, brother of David Arnot of Barncaple)".

It is interesting to consider that McGhie gains his title as Minister in 1615 and thus it is a very likely time for a man of his stature to be setting up his home, showing his wealth and status, and therefore, highly likely to be commissioning silver in very contemporary patterns/styles such as Disc Ends.

He is also recorded commissioning the communion cups for his Parish in 1617-1619 from Gilbert Kirkwood in Edinburgh. These still survive and bear not only the Parish initials but his own as well.



### **New Book**

# Australian Gold And Silversmiths Marks From the records of the Sydney Hall Mark Co and the Commonwealth of Australia Hall Mark Co, 1923 to 1928 By Jolyon Warwick James







It is not widely known that Australia had a hallmarking system. Reference is briefly made in J.P. de Castro's work: *The Law and practice of Hallmarking Gold and Silver wares* and in a few specialised texts on Australian jewellery. Now published, for the first time, is the archival material giving the background to the operations and workings of Australia's short-lived hallmarking system, and the marks used by the gold and silversmiths.

The archive consists of 43 registration forms, some loose correspondence, and (each in its own envelope) 20 silver plates on which are stamped the maker's marks.

The correspondence is very illuminating. It includes a formal letter to the Commonwealth statistician outlining the Company's background, formation, name change and marking system. A lengthy letter from the deputy Assay Master details operations and there is also the highly informative three page annual report of 1924.

This fully indexed and illustrated publication includes an introductory essay on silver and gold marking in Australia leading up to the hallmark system. It also discusses the reasons for the demise of the latter. The Company ceased operating in 1940.

There has been an overall attempt to reproduce as much of the material as possible in its original size and form. Whilst not a facsimile, this publication retains the mood of the original ledger and its contents.

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### 'P' in a Circle and the Scarlett Family of Spoonmakers

For some time it has been noted that spoons by the London spoon makers William Scarlett (active circa 1690s-1729) and his son Richard Scarlett (recorded 1719-1730) often have a small 'P' in a circle in addition to their maker's mark (Fig. 1). This has been plausibly suggested to be a workman's mark for an individual within the workshop. Unusually the workman's mark went on to be registered at Goldsmiths' Hall.



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### **And The Maker IS...?**

It appears unrecorded Provincial makers are like Buses, you wait for ages and then two come along at once.

Last year a wine label (Figs. 1 & 2) was offered for sale with the description 'London or possibly provincial'. The maker's mark was certainly one that I had not seen before; the same however could not be said of the particularly distinctive lion passant (Fig. 3).

I'm sure anyone who has studied a particular Assay Office and its punches will recognise them as one does an old friend, a familiar and unmistakable face. When they are distinctive this is a particular aid in recognising provincial work amongst smaller articles (tea tongs, sugar tongs, buttons, buckles and wine labels) as they will often have only the standard mark or latterly the standard mark and duty mark, alongside the maker's mark to aid in identification.

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

Figure 4 shows for comparison, the 'IS' marks alongside a slightly later label by William Astley of York bearing the identical (albeit slightly more worn over time) distinctive standard mark. Key features of the squared head, 'dot' eyes, letterbox mouth and distinctive whip-lash tail are consistent, as are the positions of the waisted body and legs. It is not a standard mark found anywhere other than at York.

I suspect, unless a forgotten document is unearthed, we will never definitively know the identity of this newly discovered York maker. However, with the distinctive maker's mark published here, hopefully more examples of his work will come to light.

Should further 'IS' marks be found struck upon wine labels that will certainly add weight to the suggestion that the 'IS' mark may well belong to the York retailer John Surr.

### Notes to the illustrations

- Figs. 1 & 2 (obverse and reverse) Red Port label, IS, York c.1786-1797.
- Fig. 3 there are abrasions to the marks where they have been lightly filed down as the label was refinished after assay.
