

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The Samuel Pantin Mystery

A Possible Explanation

On page 160 of the 1921 edition of the tome *English Goldsmiths And Their Marks* by Sir Charles Jackson and published by Macmillan and Co., the author illustrates a maker's mark observed on a standish belonging to The Earl of Ilchester and bearing the London hallmarking date letter for 1705/6. His rendering of this mark is a cartouche of cauldron like appearance, encompassing the letters 'PA' surmounted by a disc within which is the representation of what must be a peacock. (Fig. 1). He attributes this mark to Samuel Pantin with the date of entry in the register at Goldsmiths' Hall as 1701.

On page 175 he illustrates a mark seen on a two-handled cup belonging to The Painter Stainers' Company (Fig. 2), which he attributes to Simon Pantin giving its date of entry as 1717. It takes the form of a rectangular cartouche containing the letters 'SP' surmounted by a disc within which is the representation of a peacock. He records the date of this cup as 1721/2 but, with the letters 'SP' within it this mark couldn't have been entered in 1717 at which time the letters 'PA' would have been required by law. This being the case Jackson must have been confused since there is no entry of this format by Simon Pantin in the registers at Goldsmiths' Hall. He was also mistaken in recording that the mark on the standish was entered in 1701 (Fig. 3).

In Pickford's edited edition of Jackson's work the version of Simon Pantin's mark, which was entered in 1717 is the cauldron and disc not unlike that in Figure 1 and similar to that recorded by Grimwade (No. 2125).

The late Arthur Grimwade in his invaluable work *London Goldsmiths 1697 - 1837 Their Marks And Lives*, published by Faber and Faber in 1976 writes the following under his entry for Samuel Pantin: 'A myth for whom there is no evidence whatever. A misprint for Simon Pantin I, Jackson, page 160', furthermore, according to Grimwade, in the entry for Simon Pantin by Sir Ambrose Heal in his *The London Goldsmiths 1200 – 1800*, published in London in 1935 that the author records him as 'plateworker, Peacock Street, Martin's Lane, 1699 – 1701'. Heal also claims that he was in St. Martin in the Fields between 1709 and 1711 and that he then removed to Peacock, Castle Street, Leicester Fields from 1717 till his death in 1728. Grimwade's rendering of Simon Pantin's mark entered in 1720 is of the cauldron and disc form rather than of the rectangle and disc, which Jackson recorded. Pickford does not record a mark for 1720.

Grimwade was unsure of Simon Pantin I's background or the date of his indenture but recent research has revealed that he was the son of Simon Pantin and Jeanne Maubert who arrived in London from Rouen in about 1681. It is also known that he was apprenticed to Pierre Harache I on 30th September 1686 for a period of seven years but was not made free until 4th June 1701. The

Recent research has uncovered the fact that there was a Samuel Pantin who came to London at the end of the 17th century. Sometime before Simon Pantin senior arrived in London, c1681, his cousin Samuel made the journey from France. He was Nicolas's son who was born in Rouen in 1647. There is no record of his apprenticeship or of exactly when he came to England but he must have done so soon after finishing his term of apprenticeship as he was here by the time he was 24 years of age and the records at Threadneedle Street church show that on 23rd April 1671 he married Louyse Blondeau. He and Louyse had a son whom they named Samuel in accordance with tradition and he was baptised on 28th February 1672.

There is no record so far found of where Samuel and Louyse lived or where he worked while here but neither is his name on the bounty list. It is possible that his stay in London was short lived as his name appears in the records of the Cork Guild of Goldsmiths in Ireland in 1678 when he was appointed Warden suggesting that he was well established in the Guild by that date. He was Master in 1679 and 1686.

As 1686 is the last date on which Samuel's name is recorded it is probably the date of his death. There is no further record of Louyse and neither does Samuel junior's name appear in the records in Ireland whereas in 1686 he would have been 14 years of age and expecting to start an apprenticeship. This strongly suggests that his mother considered it expedient to return to London and have him bound to a fellow Huguenot in that city although no record of such an apprenticeship has yet come to light.

If he did take out indentures with a silversmith in London in either 1686 or 1687 his expected date of freedom would be 1693 or 1694 so that it is surprising that no record of this appears to exist. He certainly did not enter a mark in 1701 as claimed by Jackson. It seems however that he must have practiced as a silversmith and in his case a mark must be attributed to him. In spite of Grimwade's misgivings a mark (Fig. 1) appears on plate dated 1705, as recorded by Jackson, which is not the mark registered by Simon Pantin in 1701 (Fig. 3). It does, however, incorporate the motif of a peacock and is exactly like the mark entered by Simon in 1717. This mark strongly suggests that Samuel's workshop was at the sign of the peacock, Castle Street which is where Simon Pantin was after 1717 when he used the same mark. The above hypothesis is based on Jackson's finding that there was a 'PA' mark in use at least twelve years before Simon Pantin entered it, which is different from the mark he entered in 1701. It does however leave many unanswered questions not the least of which is; why is there no record of Samuel Pantin in this country other than the date of his baptism?

It would not be unreasonable for Simon Pantin to set up shop in the same street as another member of the Pantin family as soon as he had accumulated sufficient finance to be able to do so and this would account for there being two Pantin goldsmiths' workshops in Castle Street; one trading under the sign of the Peacock and the other under the sign of the Golden Ball. When in 1717 he registered a new cauldron and disc shaped mark (Grimwade 2125) at Goldsmiths' Hall he gave Castle Street as his address suggesting that he had moved from the Golden Ball to the Peacock. This remained his mark, until the reintroduction of the sterling standard in 1720 when he registered the same mark but with the letters 'SP' in place of the 'PA' that had been dictated by the legislation that introduced the Britannia standard for silver. He gave his address as Castle Street again in this entry. He continued to use this last mark until his death in 1728.

Simon Pantin's son Simon Pantin II entered a peacock mark (Grimwade 2607) on 4th February 1729, the year after his father's death, giving the Castle Street address. This mark was exactly the same as Jackson's 1721/2 mark, but with a pellet between the letters. He had married Mary Mallander who in turn entered a mark (Grimwade 2056) after his death in 1733. She gave her address as Green Street, Leicester Fields, to which address she and Simon had moved in 1731, but was still using the peacock motif. Lewis Pantin I gave Castle Street as his address, albeit now under the sign of The Golden Ewer, on entering his mark on 21st March 1734, the year after his brother Simon's death, so that a workshop in Castle Street had been in use by the Pantin family over a long period of time since Simon Pantin I was, according to the Sun Insurance policy, there by 1710 and again in 1717 and 1720 when he registered marks at Goldsmiths' Hall. Lewis Pantin I was, however, the last of the family to trade there as, for reasons not obvious, he chose not to train his son Lewis Pantin II as a large worker but instead had him bound apprentice to John Passavant who was a small worker whose family had come from Basel in Switzerland. Lewis Pantin II entered his mark as a small worker on 28th July 1768 (Grimwade 1959) giving his address as 45, Fleet Street.

To sum up, there are three marks known to be Simon Pantin's because they are all registered against his name at Goldsmiths' Hall. The first, registered nineteen days after he gained his freedom, is

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I Made A Silver Spoon!

Readers of The Finial and members of the Silver Soon Club of Great Britain share considerable knowledge of the history appearance and structure of the silver spoon.

Through membership of the Club and the regular welcome arrival of The Finial I know now so much more than when my interest was first kindled. Nothing surprising there! I have written previously that I was first taken by silver itself, the metal as such, rather than any particular objects. Over time the focus has shifted back and forth but whatever spoon has had me in its thrall I have had that silver feel.

Earlier this year my wife and I visited a Craft Fair at the Hepworth Gallery in Wakefield. One of the exhibitors was a working silversmith, Charlotte Tollyfield who, besides the work she had for sale, offered a number of courses for people to make a silver piece under her guidance and supervision.

One course was titled 'Forge Your Own Silver Spoon'. The Eureka moment. And so on Saturday and Sunday June 22nd and 23rd I presented myself at Charlotte's workshop in Sheffield. I should say that my only previous experience in metalworking took place in 1954 at my Grammar School when I made a copper caddy spoon. I need not have been concerned as Charlotte proved a patient and informative instructor and obvious expert in the techniques I was to use.

After an introduction to the layout of her workshop including the initially daunting range of hammers and mallets, saw benches, stakes (anvils), hearth and blow torch, quenching and 'pickle' baths I set to work to change a copper cylinder to an extended square section bar. Intermediate measurements were made as the metal was annealed (heated) and quenched in water and cleaned in the pickle. The copper was to provide experience in technique before moving to working silver.



Charlotte enquired if I had a design in mind for 'my' silver spoon. My own collection comprises predominantly 18th and 19th century spoons and nothing earlier (as yet). I had however much liked the elegant simplicity of the Charles I Slip-Top on the cover of The Finial, January/February 2019, which I showed to Charlotte. She thought the form pleasing and suited to the enterprise in hand.

I don't propose to give a blow-by-blow account of my endeavours though many blows were struck but by the end of my Sunday afternoon session I had made my spoon. Of interest is that the stem and bowl were forged separately and soldered to unite them. Charlotte Tollyfield is a prize-winning silversmith of fourteen years experience. She had not seen Pickford's 'Silver Flatware' and in

particular the illustration showing the stages in forging a spoon from a single bar. She commented that books on the craft are largely out-of-print so of necessity have to be obtained second-hand if available.

I carry two thoughts from my spoon-making experience to offer: firstly how much effort is necessary to effect the changes desired in pursuit of the object in mind. Secondly how worthwhile I found the experience and in particular Charlotte's encouragement guidance and occasional corrective action.

After my work was concluded I left it for Charlotte to send the spoon to the Sheffield Assay Office to be given her mark 'CRT' of which I am very proud. I recommend my experience to all members; as well as forging a spoon Charlotte teaches the raising of a whisky tumbler. Charlotte can be contacted on www.charlottetollyfield.co.uk

I am sure it will be of great sadness to members to hear, as it was for me personally, of the passing of George Forbes. George was a very active in the fields of Scottish silver both as a collector and researcher. He will be well known to many readers through his membership of both the Silver Spoon Club of Great Britain and The Silver Society where he was a regular contributor. Indeed, many of the interesting and enlightening times I had with George were around 'First Tuesdays' or Society visits.

His passion for Aberdeen silver took him down many routes and his research into various makers of the 18th century was nothing short of encyclopaedic. His greatest interest within this field was undoubtedly James Gordon of Aberdeen. I would go as far as to say he knew more about the man, his business and his silver not only than any other collector but more than James Gordon himself! George was not only enthusiastic in his research but also very generous with his time and knowledge. I will remember with fondness many enjoyable chats on silver, which often stemmed from a small spoon and ended up with the social history of North East Scotland. Always interested and happy to advise on cataloguing, attributions or any uncertainty he has helped many collectors and cataloguers with the detail of Aberdeen silver (this one definitely included).

George demonstrated this to me once with a, very friendly, chastising when I was put right for cataloguing a pair of James Gordon spoons as 'serving spoons'. I was told that was impossible and although immediately could not see the error of my ways - as it seemed pretty obvious to me what these nice but standard pieces were - I was duly wrong. Corrected with the evidence that James Gordon never made serving spoons and these had in fact to be 'long shanked gravy spoons' as Gordon termed them in his accounts, further more George's knowledge was proven as he had not only identified the owner from the initials he had found them in the original records and even had the price! And all this when the auction catalogue was still at the printers and had only been online for two days!

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Review - Lyon & Turnbull Sale

Of Scottish Silver & Applied Arts. 14th August 2019 - Edinburgh

Lyon & Turnbull had put together a sale of over 120 lots of provincial silver items. As one would expect flatware was predominant. I'll make comment on some of the provincial flatware, three items of hollowware and finally a spoon that greatly exceed expectations!

- Lot 224 Aberdeen This pair of Gravy Spoons were in excellent to near 'museum condition'.
- Lot 237 Banff What stood out on this cowrie shell snuff box was the fine quality of the engraving on its hinged cover.
- Lot 262 Elgin Catalogued as being made by an 'unknown' silversmith did not prevent these tablespoons selling at top estimate of £1200.
- Lot 271 Glasgow With slight wear to its bowl and marks this spoon, tentatively attributed to Thomas Brydson, sold well at above top estimate for £600.
- Lot 285 Greenock This toddy ladle, by a rarely encountered maker, sold at mid estimate, probably due to slight ware to the ladle and the marks.
- Lot 296 Inverness A nice sporran! At more than twice the top estimate this sporran was obviously keenly desired by the bidders.
- Lot 301 lona Unusual Alexander Ritchie items are normally highly desired. This delightful compact mirror was no exception, selling for £1500, three times top estimate.
- Lot 307 Montrose A good spoon with especially crisp maker's marks.
- Lot 322 Peterhead In fair condition, a good makers mark and slight wear to the 'PHd' and anchor marks, this spoon just reached bottom estimate at £600.
- Lot 326 Tain Overall this spoon was in fair condition. However some marks were worn and there was possible sign of a repair. It sold at top estimate of £800.
- Lot 327 Tain These eight spoons, of various condition did not sell, being bought in at £3000 against an estimate of £4-6000. Also there were signs of an earlier monogram having being erased.
- Lot 329 Wick A Toddy Ladle in good condition with only slight wear to the lower edge of the punch marks sold at below estimate for £480.
- Lot 330 Wick In better overall condition than the previous example this ladle had clear marks. Not surprisingly it sold at the higher price of £600.
- Lot 331 Wick This tablespoon was very slightly worn, however the marks were good. Selling at below estimate of £500.
- Lot 410 Edinburgh What a spoon! This Hanoverian pattern tablespoon was generally of good gauge and having good bowls, the marks being clear but with some expected wear. Referring to recent Silver Spoon Club auctions, one would expect a similar period Hanoverian spoons to sell for, in the region of up to £100 to £150. However, this spoon had early provenance due to a crest and motto likely for John Hope, 2nd Earl of Hopetoun (1704-1781). Estimated at £200-300, it rose to a hammer price of £4600! An example of good provenance creating a good price.

Conclusion

Another good sale of Burgh (provincial) silver and also a good selection of Edinburgh and Glasgow silver.


