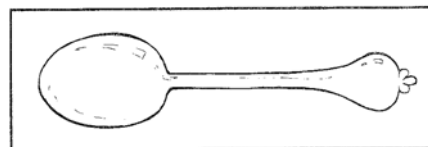

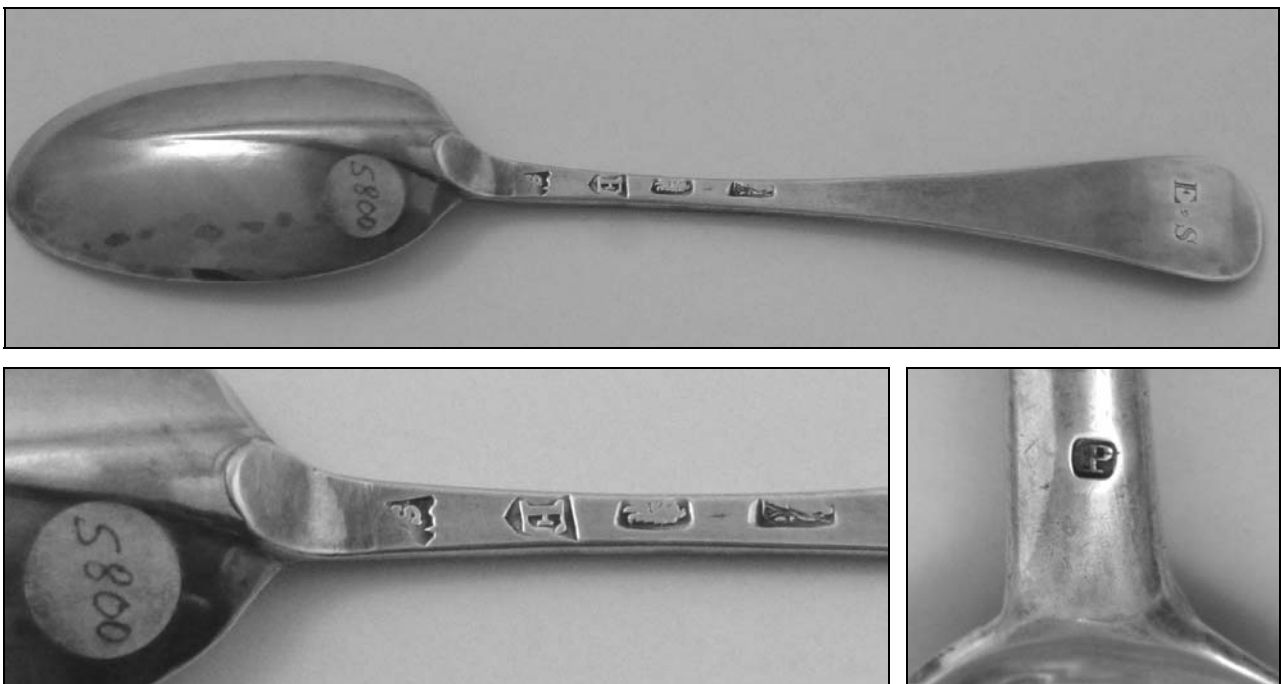

Another 'P' Mark

I refer to Luke Schrager's interesting article '*P*' in *a Circle and the Scarlett Family of Spoonmakers* (The Finial, Vol. 29/06, Jul/Aug 2019, page 7). I have a Britannia standard Hanoverian pattern tablespoon with the date letter 'E' for 1720 by William Scarlett. It has the 'P' mark.



Interestingly this is not on the back with the other marks, but on the front of the stem close to the bowl. Many years ago I sold this spoon to a client – who has long since died. Soon after I had sold it he expressed concerns about its authenticity so I repurchased it from him. This was at the time of, and occasioned by, the first spoon scare (see *Regina v Peter Ashley Russell*, Friday 16th May 1986, in the Crown Court Knightsbridge). My client's fear was that 'P' somehow might refer to Mr Russell! Repurchasing it from him I decided to submit it to the Antique Plate Committee at Goldsmiths' hall who declared it perfectly OK. So I have it innocently in my custody. It still has its case number, 5800, on a label stuck on and carefully preserved as part of its provenance.

A Duo of Great Rarity

The first point to clarify is one of nomenclature. Various names have been suggested to describe this small but very interesting group: Puritan Transitional, Split-end, Split-end Puritan and Bifid. I have a preference for the latter term, and propose to apply it. Otherwise, take your pick.

Figure 1 shows the pair and Figure 2 the marks, which are the same on both. It could be described as a decorative quatrefoil within a beaded circle, struck once in the bowl and twice on the stem.

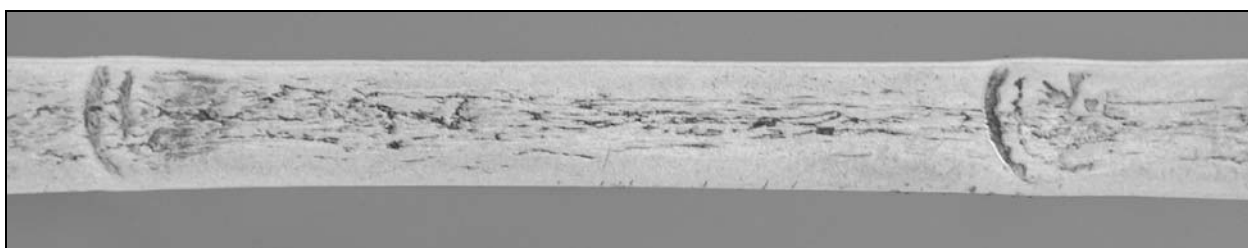

How *English and Scottish Silver Spoons* Vol. I pp. 322-3, shows a further example, formerly in the Von Callenberg Collection (later dispersed via Brand Inglis). It is marked in a manner similar to the others, [once] in bowl and twice on stem, with pricking 'AT' over 'TP' over '1681' on back of terminal. Commander How recorded "*I have seen only a very few spoons of the form here illustrated, and in every case they have borne as yet unidentified Provincial marks, but I suspect that they are all of West Country origin*". He conclude[d] "*this spoon may well have been fashioned at the date pricked upon it, 1681, I consider it should be classed as a Provincial variation of the earlier Puritan spoon of the trefid*".

I accept this conclusion, but today we can go somewhat further. These spoons, clearly of a very great rarity, fit comfortably into the mid-Wessex area, Salisbury/Winchester, and show how inventive in style local goldsmiths could be.

A Souvenir of the Wreck of the Steamer Forfarshire in 1838

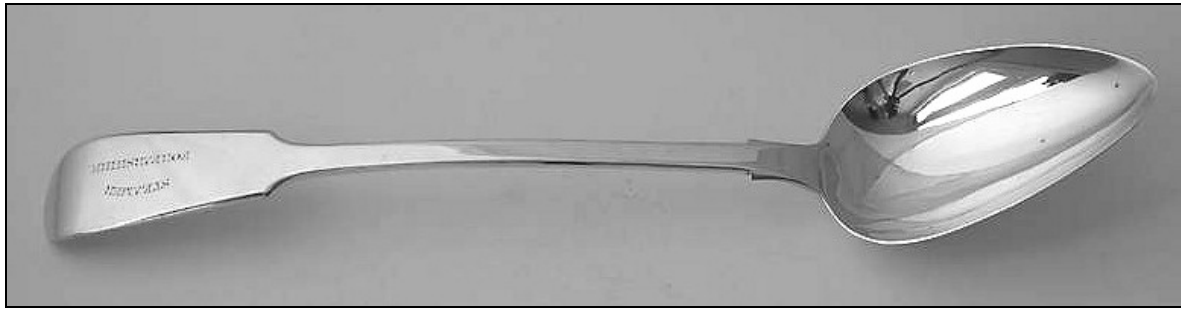

A Silver plated stuffing spoon has recently appeared on the market from the *Steam Ship Forfarshire* - one of the most famous shipwrecks of the nineteenth century and the subject of many articles in newspapers and books ever since (figs. 1 to 3). The rescue on 7th September 1838 of the 13 surviving passengers and crew (from a total of the 61 who embarked) saw the rise of Grace Darling (1815-1842), daughter of the keeper of the Longstone lighthouse on the Farne Islands, to the status of a national celebrity.

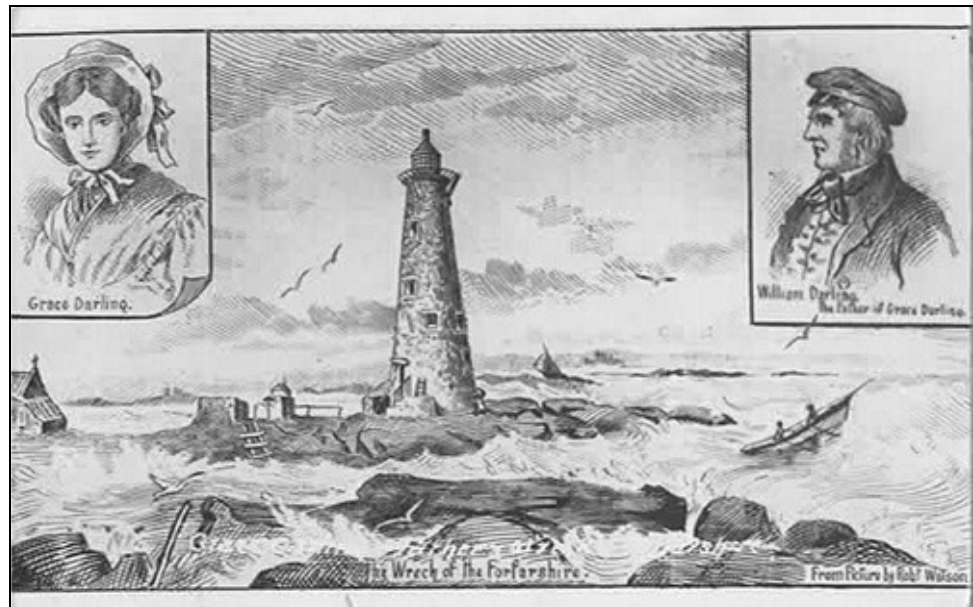


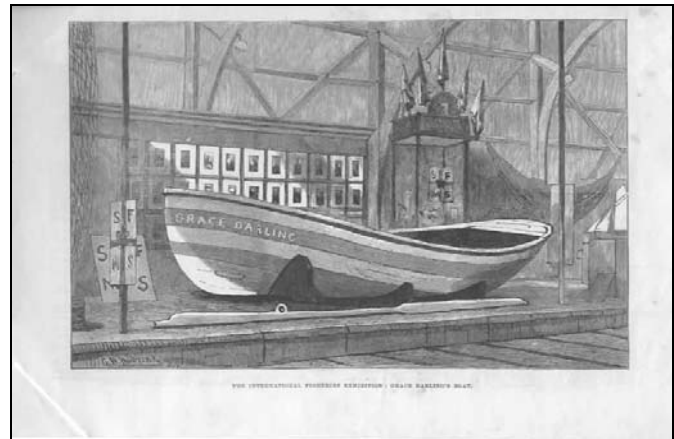

Grace Darling (fig. 4) saw the few survivors of the wreck on Big Harcar (fig. 5) and then persuaded her father (fig. 6) to attempt a rescue during the storm. The two of them, operating a boat designed for the use of three men (fig. 7), were successful and were the first recipients of the Silver medal issued by the National Institution for the Preservation of Life from Shipwreck (the future RNLI).

In addition to this, the family received the Gold medallion from the Royal Humane Society as well as Silver medals from Glasgow Humane Society and Edinburgh and Leith Humane Society and there was a subscription on behalf of Grace Darling to which Queen Victoria gave £50¹.

*hatchway...The anchors and some of the stores were safely brought to North Sunderland... [and] other parts have been thrown ashore at Amble, Hauxley etc... A part of the wreck is also lying sunk a little to the south of the Harkars rock, but a rope has been attached to it with the expectation of being able to raise it*⁹.

On October 2nd 1838 the Times recorded some of the objects from the Forfarshire ‘*which the crew had picked up off the Farne [Islands] on the morning the vessel was wrecked... as also a number of silver spoons etc*’¹⁰. An alternative source for the spoon could be the ‘Sale of the Wreck of the Forfarshire ... for the benefit of the underwriters’ held on 17th October 1838 at North Sunderland where ‘*the deep interest which has attached to the vessel’s melancholy fate, and the remarkable incidents connected with it, drew together a numerous company, including many persons from a considerable distance. The sale was attended by Mr. Just, the manager of the company at Dundee, and by the agent and sub-agent at Lloyd’s. Mr. Adamson, ship builder, Dundee was a purchaser to a considerable amount, and numerous purchases were made of articles belonging to the vessel by persons who intended to preserve them as relics. The splendid ship bell of the vessel was purchased by Mr. Clark, of Belford-hall. The wreck sold altogether for about [£500], a sum which we understand is considerably larger than was anticipated*’¹¹.

No catalogue for the auction of the wreck appears to have survived, if one were ever printed, so it is not possible to know whether any spoons were among the lots sold or whether this could be one of those pulled from the sea in the aftermath of the storm in September 1838.

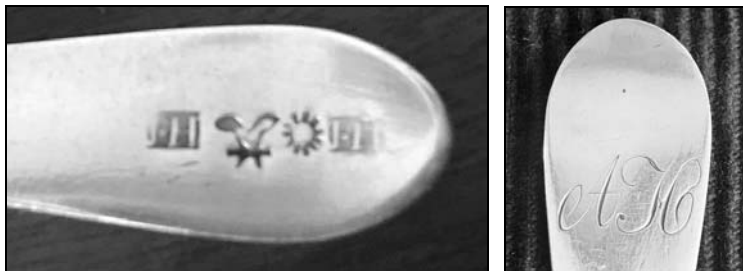

A Further Discovery

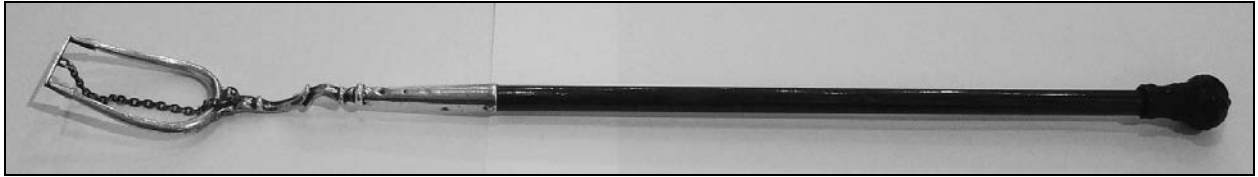
In the article ‘*An Interesting Family Of Scottish Provincial Marks And A New Discovery Within*’ by Colin Fraser, which appeared in the September/October 2007 issue of The Finial (Vol. 18/01, pages 6 & 7), he drew attention to a spoon with an unknown maker’s mark ‘J.H’. This appeared with the ‘bird in flight’ and ‘sunburst’ marks previously only seen in conjunction with the maker’s mark ‘AR’, and tentatively ascribed to Dingwall. The spoon in question was engraved with a gothic ‘H’.



Recently another spoon with the same ‘J.H’ marks has appeared, only this time engraved with a different set of initials, as can be seen in the illustrations. It would appear, therefore, that this unknown maker was perhaps more productive than previously thought.

An Interesting Georgian Toasting Fork

This Georgian toasting fork of c.1750 has silver tines and a wooden handle. The tines have a protective device in the form of two covers linked by a chain. The total length is 14 inches. It is the only example that I know of surviving with original chain. Others may exist with the basal ring for attachment, where the original chain has been lost. This protective device, if found on its own, could easily be discarded as its purpose may not be instantly recognised.
