

Allan Adams sends in a request for information on Scots or Scottish Fiddle Pattern silver: Dear friends, colleagues, and all those many silver fans that I have yet to meet. I need your help. Sitting alone, in lockdown, I started to go through my silver, with a view to being a bit more rigorous on what I would keep, and what I would sell. I came upon some Scots Fiddle pattern spoons, which, as is often the case, were bottom marked with maker's mark only. 'A.G' in a rectangular cartouche. Oh that will be Alexander Gardner, (or Gairdner as he was sometimes known in Edinburgh), I thought. But on closer inspection, I found that the mark was quite different. So I looked further, using the excellent website of the Incorporation of Goldsmiths, Edinburgh.

There were a few possibilities, but it didn't seem to be Alexander Grant or Alex Galloway of Aberdeen either. And then I found it. Adam Graham of Glasgow. But wait. Surely this pattern comes from Scandinavia. What is a West Coast maker doing making one of these spoons? And so, as is my favourite weekend occupation (but now on a Wednesday morning - what luxury!) I hauled piles and piles of books off the shelves, and started looking for information.

And the more I looked, the less I knew. There didn't seem to be a large body of work on the subject. Nor was there a great deal to be found on t'internet. Five paragraphs written by Joy Scott Whyte in 1966, an excellent article written by Estelle Quick for The Finial in 2011, and a few passing mentions in the various spoon books. All with slightly differing opinions. So I rolled up my sleeves and got to work.

I wanted to know where this pattern had originated. I found examples from Norway, Denmark, Belgium (although strangely, not so far, from France), and Hamburg. There were lots mentioned in the Martin Gubbins sale, but only three were illustrated. I emailed all the Scottish museums, but sadly most of their staff are furloughed, so cannot help for now. So now I want to know everything there is to know, and I would like to ask for everyone's help.

Do you have any of these spoons? Would you be willing to tell me about them, or share anything you know about them? Maybe even allow me to use a photograph of them? I'd love to collate a register of as many known examples as possible, with special interest in the earliest and latest known examples (including later ones), foreign ones, and most especially any that have more than just maker's marks. Any and all information will be gratefully received, and once I have written it up, credit will be given to all who are able to contribute.



From Cannons To Stowe

A Spoon That Shows The Boom And Bust of the Dukes of Chandos And Buckingham in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries



All spoons, indeed all objects, have a history but for most there is little or no evidence left to show it. This silver-gilt Old English pattern dessert spoon made in London in 1762 by Paul Callard is, however, a notable exception.



The spoon is engraved with two crests; on the front there is that of Brydges underneath a Duke's coronet for Henry Brydges, 2nd Duke of Chandos (1708-1771). On the reverse is the crest of Grenville underneath a Marquess's coronet for his grandson-in-law Richard Grenville, 2nd Marquess of Buckingham (1776-1839). The fact that the Marquess of Buckingham's wife, Lady Anna Elizabeth Brydges (1780-1836) was granddaughter and heiress of the second Duke of Chandos shows that the spoon was part of the inheritance that Brydges brought into the Grenville family.

Additionally the crest of the Marquess of Buckingham is underneath the gilding, which means that both the crest and the gilding were added between 1813, when Buckingham inherited his Marquessate, and 1822, when he was promoted to the Dukedom of Buckingham *and Chandos*. Although it is not possible to be certain, the most likely date for the gilding is 1813, to commemorate Buckingham's accession to the family title.

Traditions of Edinburgh by Robert Chambers: An Extract

In doing some research I recently stumbled across an interesting passage relating to Edinburgh goldsmiths and their trade in spoons. Taken from '*Traditions of Edinburgh*' by Robert Chambers, first published in 1824, the book is a treasure chest of memories and recollections of old Edinburgh and provides fascinating details of life within the city. This short passage gives glimpses of the goldsmiths trade during the 18th century, the makers, the clients and the process of commissioning silver.

GOLDSMITHS

"The goldsmiths of those days were considered a superior class of tradesmen; they appeared in public with scarlet cloak, cocked hat, and cane, as men of some consideration. Yet in their shops every one of them would have been found working with his own hands at some light labour, in a little recess near the window, generally in a very plain dress, but ready to come forth at a moment's notice to serve a customer. Perhaps, down to 1780, there was not a goldsmith in Edinburgh who did not condescend to manual labour.

As the whole trade was collected in the Parliament Close, this was of course the place to which country couples resorted, during the last century, in order to make the purchase of silver teaspoons, which always preceded their nuptials. It was then as customary a thing in the country for the intending bridegroom to take a journey, a few weeks before marriage, to the Parliament Close, in order to buy the silver spoons, as it was as the bride to have all her clothes and stock of bedfurniture inspected by a committee of matrons upon the wedding eve. And this important transaction occasioned two journeys: one, in order to select the spoons, and prescribe the initials which were to be marked upon them; the other to receive and pay for them. It must be understood that the goldsmiths of Edinburgh then kept scarcely any goods on hand in their shops, and that the smallest article had to be bespoken for them some time before it was wanted. A goldsmith, who entered as an apprentice about the beginning of the reign of George III, informed me that they were beginning only at that time to keep a few trifling articles on hand. Previously another old custom has been abolished. It had been usual, upon both the occasions mentioned above, for the goldsmith to adjourn with his customer to John's Coffee House¹, or to the Bajen-hole², and to receive the order or the payment, in a comfortable manner, over a dram and a caup of small ale; which were upon the first occasion paid for by the customer, and upon the second by the trader; and the goldsmith then was perhaps let into the whole secret counsels of the rustic, including a history of his courtship – in return for which he would take pain to amuse his customer with a sketch of the city news. In time, as the views and capitals of Parliament Close goldsmiths became extended, all these pleasant customs were abandoned".

Notes

- 1. John's Coffee House was then situated in the north east corner of Parliament Close.
- 2. The Bajen Hole situated immediately to the east of Forrester's Wynd and opposite to the Old Tolbooth. The name, a mystery to later generations, seems to bear reference to the Baijens or Baijen Class a term bestowed in former days upon the junior students in the college. Bajan or bajen is the French bejaune, 'bec jaune', 'greenbill', 'greenhorn', 'freshman'.

Journeymens' Marks

Anyone interested in English silver flatware of the 18th and early 19th centuries will not fail to have noticed what appear to be damage marks near the hallmarks. These marks appear mostly on London flatware, although they can be seen on flatware assayed at other offices (Figure 1a - Edinburgh hallmarks for 1810 with a 'cross' mark and Figure 1b – Exeter hallmarks for 1837 has a 'heart-shaped' mark), and very little is known about them at present. These marks are Journeymen's marks.

Such a mark is the identifying mark of the actual workman who made the piece and who was employed by the 'maker' (now sponsor) whose mark must appear by law and is registered at Goldsmiths Hall. No such register was kept for journeymen and the matter of establishing who worked for whom is an area of research still waiting to be undertaken.

These journeymen were craftsmen who had been made free of a Livery Company having completed a term of apprenticeship under the guidance of a master goldsmith and were thus qualified to practice their craft. However to set up a workshop was an expensive undertaking and a young man newly qualified was unlikely to have the necessary finance for such an undertaking until he had worked in an established workshop for some time. Campbell (in *The London Tradesman*) reckoned that it required between £20 and £100 to set oneself up as a snuffbox maker¹. Commonly it would take at least two years for such a young craftsman to acquire enough finance to set up his own workshop and sometimes he would do so in partnership with a fellow apprentice. Sometimes a newly qualified goldsmith would marry his Master's daughter and thus gain a partnership in the workshop in which he had done his training. For this reason it may eventually be shown that some journeymen's marks had a short lifespan.

It should be said that these marks are found only on flatware and first appear after the introduction of top marking in 1781, the earliest I know of is on a piece dated 1785, and took the form of marks such as dots, crosses, crescents, hearts etc (Fig. 2). They were punched into the silver next to, and sometimes incorporated with, the maker's mark. Some were quite obviously impressed with a properly engraved punch while others appear to have been created by merely 'marking' the piece in some way with any steel tool or point.

These marks must not be confused with the large broad arrow mark, which appears near the hallmarks on some flatware of the early 19th century and punched quite deeply into the silver. This mark indicates that such flatware was originally in issue to the officer class of the Royal Navy.

A Job Lot of Solid Silver Sterling Spoons

'A Job Lot of Solid Silver Sterling Spoons', this was the listing on the well-known Internet auction site caught my eye as I skimmed down to see what items corresponding to my interests were listed. A self-appointed daily task especially engaging to deal with the restrictions imposed in lockdown for those of us 'sheltering' from Coronavirus!

There were seven spoons in all 'direct from a deceased estate' in obviously well used condition. But what had I bought? Were there hidden gems just waiting for my revelations?

My first sort through showed a couple of souvenir spoons, an Apostle of 16th century form, a salt spoon, a pair of demitasse coffee spoons and a teaspoon. Most were in need of a good clean with heavy tarnish and some encrustation especially on the apostle and one of the souvenir items. Time for recourse to the aluminium plate and washing soda method not much mentioned but in my experience effective.

The first souvenir spoon is simply impressed '935' on the back of the stem, presumably a continental silver standard. The finial comprises a rectangular shield with an upright sword in a laurel wreath and a crest of three castellated towers. Parenthetically this is said to be the oldest heraldic grant of arms in Asia, dated 1620. Below the shield is written 'Batavia'. Of course I had heard of Batavia, but the detail eluded me! On checking, Batavia turned out to be the capital of the Dutch East Indies, which became Indonesia in 1949 when the capital was, renamed Djakarta. This argues for a pre-1949 and more likely pre-WW II date for this spoon.

The second souvenir is rather lightly made and has a maker's mark 'J.S.Zn 90'. I think this is probably silver-plated. The finial comprises a solid circle surmounted by a polar bear. Beneath the circle is written 'Roosendaal'. It seemed to me likely to be a town in the Arctic Circle but, Google to the rescue, revealed a much more interesting account. Roosendaal is situated in Brabant South Holland. The city was liberated from the occupying forces in October 1944 by the Polar Bear Division of the Royal Tank Regiment! The niceties of the military history escape me but the Polar Bear Monument apparently can still be found in Roosendaal.

The Apostle spoon finial shows St Andrew bearing a saltire cross at his side. The casting certainly benefited from the cleaning to reveal the detail. This spoon though quite small is good to handle. I couldn't discern the maker but the London and sterling marks are clear as is the date letter for 1940. I am surprised that the assay was still being undertaken but gather that the assay operated throughout the war. After the London premises were bombed in 1941 operations continued in Reigate.

The teaspoon bears the crown for Sheffield the sterling mark the letter 'B' for 1944 and 'HA' for the firm of Atkins. There is also a registered number '808642'. The pattern is probably Beverley an Art Deco pattern popular in the 1930s according to Pickford. This spoon looks like it has 'had a life' with a network of fine pinpricks and scratches to the back and interior of the bowl. The tip of the bowl shows curling and asymmetry. I quite like this one and I speculate that it stirred many a welcome brew.

The little Old English pattern salt spoon is hallmarked for Sheffield 1932, with maker's mark 'E.V' for Emile Viner. The spoon is in reasonable used condition and is surely one of the items so often misplaced from the ubiquitous cruet sets of the period.

The pair of coffee spoons reminds me that Pickford comments that 18th century coffee spoons were larger than tea spoons as coffee was the cheaper commodity. Times change and these rather elegant small spoons are for after dinner coffee for sure. They are Old English in form with the script initial 'B' hand engraved on the terminal. Something of a surprise on the back as they are marked 'Sterling Silver G.M.Co .925' (delta symbol) 'h' for the Gorham Manufacturing Company. I can only guess how they came to be in the 'deceased estate', an American connection or liberated mementoes of a trip to the States? But I don't find large quantities of Gorham flatware evident here in the U.K.



Found It!

I have always liked Simon Moore's publications on table cutlery, be they the slim volumes of Shire Publications or his larger book on Artists' Spoons & Related Table Cutlery. Simon's studies of the Liberty ranges of spoons and cutlery are most engaging.

I have only a small observation to make following Simon's article in the January/February 2020 edition of The Finial. Simon points out that the early designs by Archibald Knox '... show Knox's occasional design quirkiness'. This is certainly true of the Neeba and Neb designs. The Neeba being deemed so quirky that it '... has not yet been found as shown in the original design... with its folded over finial and two thorn-like points'.



The pictures show a cased pair of spoons with hallmarks for London 1899 using the 'Ly&Co' mark. The Neeba is made to the full original design, 94.5gms, 21.5cm.





Could it be that this pair, which have no enamelling, are an original trial pair and thus made from the full original designs as shown in Figure 12 of Simon's article? The case is not marked, as sets sold by Liberty typically are but it is contemporary with the spoons. I look forward to the results of Simon's future researches.

Another Iona Nunnery Spoon by George Hunt, 1936

I read the interesting article by Colin Fraser on the 'Hopeful' Scottish Spoons (The Finial, May/Jun '20, pages 10 to13) and although I cannot attribute the actual antique versions of the Scottish wrythen and nail-head spoons from the top of my head, I can show another reproduction of the famous and amazing late 12th century lona Nunnery Spoon. This version by George Hunt in 1936 is more fanciful than Alex Ritchie's version, which appears to be a more faithful copy.

Hunt's 'take' on the lona spoon combines a bit of the Anointing spoon from the Queen's regalia in that his spoon is gilt and has been mounted with a few garnet and chrysoprase cabochons on the broad part of the tri-partite stem that characterises spoons of the later Migration and early Medieval period, along with the more usual leaf shaped bowl (Fig. 1).

Feedback

Graham Bliss points out that the gothic 'DE' mark puzzling Colin Fraser in the May/June 2020 issue of The Finial, page 15, is in fact the 'JC' mark for Joseph Collier of Plymouth, just rotate the mark through 180 degrees. The monogram or device mark shown on Colin's spoon with this maker's mark is, however, something of a mystery. This second mark is known on Hanoverian and Hanoverian Rattail tablespoons and basting spoons. It occurs with Collier's gothic mark and with a more Roman mark 'IC' that is also the mark of Joseph Collier.

Tim Kent in his book West Country Silver Spoons and their Makers 1550 - 1750 refers to the gothic mark and notes that 'Sundry other marks attributable to Collier have been noted'. Figure 1 shows the device mark on a Hanoverian tablespoon with the more Roman style letters. The spoon is engraved with betrothal initials and dated 1736 as shown in Figure 2.



The device mark is reminiscent of the 17th century Exeter marks as it appears to have an 'X' below a crown with 'JC', a little stretched, laid over the 'X'. In the same way this device may relate to the Plymouth coat of arms, which also has the basic form of an 'X' on a shield with crown above. Tim Kent comments that Collier retailed or supplied silver from other silversmiths and at the same time probably made some spoons.

Could this device mark have been used to indicate a piece made by Collier?

Paul Holmes emails: I noticed with interest R B Williams' image of the Becco Chapel Communion Spoon, The Finial, Vol. 30/05, May/June 2020, page 8. Assuming that the overall length of the spoon is 159mm, and not 59mm, then I saw its double some years ago at St Mary Abbots, Kensington.



The details of that spoon were as follows: 'strainer spoon with egg-shaped bowl. The bowl is pierced with a light foliate pattern towards the tip end. The stem is flat with straight sides, tapering slightly to the finial end, with a double collet near

the base. The heel is markedly strap-like and the finial consists of an open cross design, a foliated quatrefoil. There are five marks, maker, GA, George Adams, uncrowned leopard's head, lion passant, date letter 'U', for 1875/6, cycle XX and the duty mark, all these four being punched as one. The overall length of the spoon is 150mm'.

Given that the St Mary Abbot's spoon is 24 years later the added decoration on the finial cross is not unexpected, though it is clear that this continued to be a popular design. So much so that Adams designed a matching knife for St Mary Abbots, though a little longer, so providing a utensil for both 'elements'. In the 19th century the spoon had become a regular part of a communion set, not just in the City but even in some of the rural churches throughout the land and, as R B Williams shows us in Fig 4, in the territories overseas.

Richard Stagg replies: Paul Dudley asked about pre 1721 Newcastle spoons (The Finial, May/Jun '20, page 15). I have what I think is a clear example of what he is enquiring about. This is a tablespoon by Francis Batty II with the 'F' mark for 1708/9 which was probably used for the next three or four years. It is interesting that this spoon has a much later armorial, I suspect late Victorian or Edwardian, that has its motto in English rather than the usual Latin 'Insult me not'.







It is noticeable that at this time there seems to be quite a regional difference in how much reshaping following marking seems to have been needed. I have examples of these 'Queen Anne' Hanoverian from most of the assay towns and the only one that has quite distorted marks is one from York. London seemed to strike with a light touch whilst the provincial offices made sure that their marks were good and obvious.

Christian Burgar enquires: Do you have anyone in your esteemed membership that may have knowledge on trifle or jelly spoons as used from a long glass that were made during the Regency time period. I have a number of questions along this topic, which I am desperate to explore.

The spoon style that I am enquiring about is of the traditional 'mustard spoon' shape and appears in more ranges of length than I have had hot dinners. In Fiddle Thread & Shell I have lengths ranging from 7cm to 16cm, and even a 23cm. That suggests to me that this style of spoon had many more functions than we may have first thought other than mustard or egg.



To me a traditional egg spoon is of the form of a small teaspoon with shoulders. I am happy to go along with this because eggs are generally of the same length whichever end you decide to enter by. All these forms of egg spoon are of an identical ish length whichever pattern one is comparing, but I am referring particularly to Fiddle Thread & Shell.

I was once talking with a curator at the V&A about this very topic and as far as she/they were concerned this was a nut still waiting to be cracked. The paintings and cartoons they had used initially did not show clearly enough the spoon's style. Then I asked the question, do you need a 12cm spoon of this style to eat an egg. Logic suggests perhaps not. But to get to the bottom of a long jelly glass, perhaps.

I am trying to establish exactly the range of length of these types of spoons as I think they may have been multi functional, with different lengths aimed at different functions and I wondered if any of your members might have thoughts on this.

Ian Smith asks for help: Is there anybody out there who makes punches for hallmarking or tool marking? I'm a silversmith, making spoons amongst other things and also collecting them. I am sure all Finial readers, if collectors, will appreciate good marks as I do. Over the years I have become disenchanted with the <u>depth</u> of modern Assay marks. They will never last 100 or 200 years, that we find in our collecting, in fact, many are still deeper today than a modern Assay mark.


I took the problem into my own hands a few years ago, and commissioned an incuse 'Mull' punch to use after the assay mark on my work. This can be hammered in deeply as silver will take it without any distortion, which happens all the time with the modern Assay punch, unless a laser is used, but I'm an artisan, so no laser for me!

I try to make spoons with a maker's mark that will last as long as the spoon! Now I need an incuse punch for my mark, as the company that made my 'Mull' punch is no longer manufacturing them. I'm hoping someone will be able to point me in the right direction.
