

As I say every year, if you are thinking about sending spoons in for the Christmas auction, please try and get them in early as possible as it does help me.



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Eight Australian Apostle Spoons

I recently acquired at a Sydney Auction, a set of 8 Apostle spoons. The team comprises: The Master, St Peter (key), St Thomas (spear), St Jude (long cross), St Andrew (saltire cross), St John (cup), St Matthew (money bags) and St Paul (sword). They are all more or less of 16th and 17th century apostle spoon proportions being 18.5cm long and weighing on average 56 grams. They have exceptionally well modelled figures each with a bold Saint Esprit nimbus. The saints are secured to the stem of the spoon by a 'V' notch as was common to London manufacture of those centuries. The bowls diverge from the contemporary manufacturing methods. Instead of being made from the same piece of metal as the stem, they are formed separately. They have a short shank, which is soldered onto the spoon stem. From a design perspective the bowl shapes are closest in form to the later 17th Apostle spoons, but not quite true to the originals. They appear very marginally too ovoid, square in the shoulders and do not angle down from the stem in quite the same way.







Having said that, they are very handsome spoons, made by Arthur Eglinton (Peter) Campbell in the last quarter of 20th century. His details can be found in Christine Erratt's excellent book: *Marks on Australian Silver 1950 to 2005* (page 64). The entry is reproduced here and indicates that Campbell apparently also had registered marks at both the London and Sheffield Assay Offices. These Apostle spoons bear just his Australian marks.

A question arises with regard to the notably well-defined Apostle figures. Did Campbell cast them himself? If so, where did he obtain the moulds or models? It seems more likely that he bought-in the Apostles from an outside source and that they presumably came with 'V' notch joints thus dictating how he was to attach them to the stems. The scenario of buying-in the Apostles calls into question where he might have obtained them. If any readers are able to cast light on this it would be interesting to know.



Duty Mark On Its Own, Why?

The Act introducing plate duty (and its mark) in 1784¹ states unequivocally that 'all silver plate which shall or **ought to be** (my emphasis) touched, assayed, and marked in Great Britain shall pay a duty after the rate of sixpence for every ounce troy...'².

That the head was regarded simply as a receipt of duty was clarified in 1856 by William Garnet, Inspector General of the Board of Inland Revenue at an enquiry into hallmarking: 'The Queen's head is merely to denote that the duty has been paid upon the plate. It has nothing to do with the quality, it merely denotes the payment of duty, There are separate marks provided to denote the standard, but those are not Government marks'3.

On being asked whether the Commissioners of Stamps would be prepared to strike the Queen's head on an article of substandard silver, gold or indeed base metal, he re-iterated that they were only interested in receiving the tax and that if any duty was paid on sub standard goods this would be refunded.

Once the principle of the duty head being **only** a receipt is accepted, this explains a number of apparent anomalies in hallmarking. For example, how is it possible to have an item of George IV silver with a George III head? The reason is that being **only** a receipt the actual head did not matter! The most extreme example I have seen was in the late Martin Gubbins collection where a piece of silver of 1837 had a George III head!




Fig. 1. Receipt stamp dated 1905 showing use of a postage stamp of Edward VII

A modern analogy of the comparative unimportance of the current sovereign's head in this context dates back prior to the 1950s, when it was necessary to sign a receipt over a postage stamp. This did not have to be of the current monarch but that of any previous one as all stamps, like coins were still valid (Fig. 1).

<u>Review – Lyon & Turnbull Sale of Scottish Works of Art & Whisky</u> 12th August 2020 In Edinburgh



May I firstly apologise to members, that due to the current restrictions, I was unable to attend both the viewing and the sale. Comments that I make about a few items are made after having only seen condition reports and notes in the catalogue. Within the silver section of this sale was a good variety of provincial and Edinburgh flatware. Included amongst the reported items will be what I believe to be the third most expensive early Scottish spoon to have been sold in Scotland.

- Lot 151 Aberdeen The condition report for this set of six mid 18th century Hanoverian pattern spoons by Alexander Forbes, inferred that they were in reasonable overall condition with the last mark softly struck. It was not surprising that they sold well at £1,900. More than twice the top estimate.
- Lot 152 Aberdeen Stated as in 'very good condition throughout', this rare provincial strainer spoon and serving spoon I thought might have sold to overestimate. Estimate £300-500. Sold for £440.
- Lot 192 Elgin In the July/August edition of The Finial, Allan Adams requested information about Scottish Fiddle pattern spoons. I am sure that he will be interested that this rarely encountered 'set of six' spoons, by James Humphrey, were of good gauge and clearly marked with the bowls having wear to points. Engraved initials were original and well done. They sold for the low estimate of £400.
- Lot 228 Peterhead From the catalogue photo of this toddy ladle and its marks, it would appear to be of good gauge. Reported as having light surface wear and marks, bowl in good condition and a crisp monogram, I would have thought that this ladle would have sold. Unfortunately it did not, against the estimate of £1,000 -1,500.
- Lot 236 Tain Overall this spoon, by Hugh Ross I, would appear to be of good gauge with some minor wear and be in fair condition. However, as reported some marks, St. Duthac & another were worn. It sold at over twice the top estimate for £1,100.



Lot 275 - Edinburgh - What a rarity! There is record of between only 40 & 50 early Scottish Disc End spoons. It was disappointing that I was unable to actually see this spoon. The condition report stated that it was in good overall condition with the hallmarks being well struck and remarkably clear. Engraved and punched decoration being clear. Estimated between £3,000 - £5,000, the rarity of this spoon pushed the final hammer price to £21,000. The third highest price for an early Scottish spoon to have been sold in Scotland. (The Barncleuch Puritan spoon sold for £27,000 (2010) & The Boyd Disk End spoon for £22,000 (2012).



<u>Conclusion</u> - Another good sale of Burgh (provincial) silver and also a good selection of Edinburgh and Glasgow silver.

<u>Date for your Diary</u> - Bonhams Edinburgh, having postponed their annual 'The Scottish Sale' in May, have informed me that they are now planning to hold it on Wednesday 14th October. I would suggest that members keep an eye on Bonhams web site as this date may be altered again if circumstances change.

A Rare Set of George II Royal Tablespoons

As we have all said when in conversation about why we collect silver and spoons it is often to do with the story and the provenance. I recently stumbled across a fine set of six spoons that illustrate this, I think, perfectly. These standard spoons tell many interesting tales from a royal provenance owned by eight monarchs and a case of unjust inheritance causing a remarkable family rift.


Fig. 2. Detail of Royal monogram within garter

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intended to recycle old silver from the Royal Jewel House. To this end for this commission and others, including the remarkable commission of five eight light chandeliers after a design by William Kent, it is recorded that 'a salver, a wine fountain and cistern, pastry dishes, a night lamp and stand, one hundred and twenty plates and dishes, a spittoon, further plates and dishes, tea kettles, a chamber pot, a standish (inkstand), five keys and a warming stand' were supplied to Behrens with close control taken over the weight and purity of the silver.










Fig. 4. One of the Hanoverian Royal table candlestick, by Balthazar Friedrich Behrens, Hanover circa 1735

Various sets of these candlesticks and other items by Behrens for the Hanoverian Court still survive. An impressive group of tablewares and one of the chandeliers can be seen in The Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Two others of the chandeliers are within the collection of the National Trust and are displayed in situ at Anglesey Abbey, Cambridgeshire.

The silver stayed at the Palace of Herrenhausen until shortly after the Seven Weeks war in 1866 and the Prussian annexation of Hanover. The plate survived intact, as it has been hidden in a vault within the Royal palace although the palace had been looted by Prussian troops.

With the family's deposition from the throne, although allowed to keep the titular title of King of Hanover they were also given the title of Dukes of Brunswick. They fled to Penzig, Austria and to the villa of Gmuden, where the plate would latterly be kept.

The collection descended through the family until the death of Ernest Augustus II and was sold by his son Ernest Augustus III in 1924 to the Viennese dealers Gluckselig and to the Crichton Brothers of Bond Street, London, arguably the most important dealers in antique silver in Europe at the time. It was then split by them with items variously being sold to collectors and institutions alike. To this day both major institutional and private collections consider items with this provenance amongst the most important within their collections for not only the fine quality and provenance of the items but the remarkable story they tell.

This surely proves that an item as simple as a spoon, or this case set of six, can have a remarkable story to tell and not only be witness but be part of history as it happens. When considered the royal lineage of these spoons is amazing and irrefutably owned by the following; King George II, King George III, King George IV, King William IV, H.R.H. Ernest Augustus I Duke of Cumberland and King of Hanover, King George V of Hanover, King Ernest Augustus II of Hanover, King Ernest Augustus III of Hanover.

If only such items could talk!

N.B one spoon with the same provenance but by a different maker did appear in The Finial postal auction some time ago. Here is hoping it won't be long until another appears for collectors to compete over.
