

## **Early Scottish Silver Collectors** The Beginnings of a Collecting Field Gavin 1<sup>st</sup> Marquess and 7<sup>th</sup> Earl of Breadalbane

Rightly, much weight is given to provenance in collecting silver; however the relatively young subject of Scottish silver makes this more difficult than in many other fields. While provenances are available they often only go as far back as the 'early sales' of Scottish and provincial silver in the 1980s. Indeed many of the larger London auctions seem not to have handled Scottish silver separately or catalogued it in the main sales until the 1950s and 1960s, unless highly important early objects. Indeed it is this unknown of Scottish silver that has often been its allure and collectiveness from the earliest collectors to the current.

Perhaps the earliest collector of note is Gavin 1st Marquess and 7<sup>th</sup> Earl of Breadalbane. His collection, while now dispersed, is perhaps the best known of the period, not by its contents alone, nor auction catalogue as testament, but by the virtually unique applied collector's mark he used on pieces within the collection, 'Breadalbane' in script struck incuse. During his lifetime he built an unrivalled collection of objects and spoons. Many of these marks and his attributions (some now considered erroneous) formed the main reference for the Scottish sections in Sir Charles Jacksons' first (and later) edition of English Goldsmiths and Their Marks in 1905.

Gavin Campbell was born in 1851 and succeeded his father John, 6<sup>th</sup> Earl in 1871. The succession of father in 1867 had not been a simple one as he was not descended from the main Breadalbane line and was a cadet branch, the Campbells of Glenfalloch. When considering the importance the family had in Scotland and the lands they held, in excess of 450,000 acres from Perthshire to the Atlantic Ocean, this five-year dispute set legal history.

Educated at St Andrews he succeeded his father as 7<sup>th</sup> Earl of Breadalbane, Earl of Holland; Viscount of Tay and Paintland; Lord Glenorchy, Benederaloch, Ormelie and Weik; and Baronet of Nova Scotia. He was created Baron Breadalbane in 1873; and Earl of Ormelie and 1<sup>st</sup> Marquis of Breadalbane in 1885.

He married in 1872, Lady Alma Imogen Carlotta Leonore Graham, the youngest daughter of the 4<sup>th</sup> Duke of Montrose.

A favourite of Victorian society he held many important roles within the country, notably Lord-in-Waiting to the Queen, Treasurer to the Royal Household 1880 – 1885, Privy Councillor 1880, Lord Steward of the Household 1892 – 1895, Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland 1883 – 1885, A.D.C. to King Edward VII, Keeper of the Privy Seal of Scotland, 1907, Brigadier-General of the Royal Company of Archers - the Royal Body Guard for Scotland, Colonel of the Highland Cyclists Battalion; Colonel of the 5th Volunteer Battalion Royal Highlanders, Chairman of the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Argyllshire, from 1914 and Member of the Fisheries Board.

In 1893 he was created a Knight of the Garter and was also a Knight of Justice of the Order of St. John and a Knight of the Swedish Order of the Seraphim.

However the importance of the 1<sup>st</sup> Marquess was not solely as a collector, researcher or contributor of the antique and unknown, he was also a key commissioner and supporter of contemporary Scottish silver, notably that of David MacGregor of Perth. This is best seen within the commission by the '*Tenantry on The Breadalbane Estates*' of a pair of covered vases on granite stands and freedom casket with illuminated scroll. Although sadly now, in part, split with the location of one vase unknown, this commission is rare within the Scottish archive as preparatory drawings and finished products still survive.

## A Mysterious Plate Tax of the 18<sup>th</sup> Century

In 1723 His Majesty's Excise officials petitioned the Goldsmiths' Company to mark plate on which duty had been paid in the following words: '... That there be a stamp to denote the charging placed on each piece capable of bearing it at the time of weighing off...'. The Company considered this and even proposed that a crowned date letter could be used but, in the event, no such mark was adopted.

The reason for this petition was that, although the Plate Duty Act<sup>2</sup> of 1719 was specific in the form that hallmarks for both sterling and Britannia silver should take, no mention was made of a specific mark for plate on which duty had been paid. Since the collection of such duty was complicated and relied heavily on the honesty of the silversmiths it was estimated that by 1723 the Exchequer was at some considerable loss.

From this it can be seen quite clearly that, following the introduction of the Plate Duty Act on 1<sup>st</sup> June 1720, no mark was used on plate relating to the duty brought in by that Act.

Figure 1 is of a spoon that passed through fellow Silver Spoon Club member Gary Bottomley's hands some years ago about which he and I have had some discussion by email.

This is a perfectly ordinary Hanoverian rattail spoon made by Richard Scarlett and struck with his mark that he registered on 24<sup>th</sup> September 1719 (Grimwade 2487).

As can be seen in Figure 2 the spoon is clearly marked with the date letter 'E' which came into effect on 1<sup>st</sup> June 1720, the same day on which the Plate Duty Act took effect, and there are two other hallmarks apparent; a clear Britannia and above it, although worn, the 'torn' base of the lion's head erased showing that this spoon is of Britannia standard.

There is however a fifth mark clearly struck above the maker's mark comprising a rectangular box with the letters 'TAX' within it. This mark is sufficiently deeply struck that if the other marks on this spoon were equally worn it would be possible to determine that this 'TAX' mark had been struck at a later date but since the date letter appears to be just as deeply struck it is not possible to draw this conclusion although the possibility remains open.

Since, whenever it was struck, this mark cannot be connected with the new duty it must have been serving some other purpose. Gary wondered if it could have been a drawback mark struck only on plate that was exported but the Act of 1719 does cover such plate and is quite specific on how it should be treated. As with the duty itself there is no mention of a mark to be used when such duty was refunded.

As far as I can discover the only other Act of about this date affecting silver was an Act of 1720 dealing with exemptions from duty for small plate. This took effect from 1<sup>st</sup> July 1721<sup>3</sup> and refers back to the previous Act of 1719. There is no mention of marking at all in this Act and I can think of no other taxation connected with silver plate to which this mysterious mark could refer.

The plot thickens on referral to back issues of The Finial where I find that in the July/August 2005 issue, Tony Dove wrote a short article on this very subject and, in fact, we seem to be both writing about the same spoon since the photograph he used looks identical to the one I have used! At first thought therefore it would seem that not only is this a rare spoon but it may be unique.

I have discussed this with Tony and he pointed out that no one would have gone to the trouble of creating a punch of this sort for a 'one off' striking and that whatever its purpose it must have been used on other plate. Although neither of us can conceive of the purpose this punch served we are agreed that there must be other examples of it still to be found.


It is possible that such plate was used overseas to pay some local tax, since sterling was highly respected round the world, and thus became currency. If this were the case this mark would be more commonly found overseas than in this country.

Whatever the origins of this mysterious mark Gary, Tony and I would very much like to hear from any fellow member who has come across it on any sort of plate either in England or elsewhere in the world.

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## **Feedback**

**Tim Kent** has some feedback: I can help Duncan Robertson over his Scottish spoon (The Finial, Oct/Nov '14, page 12). It is normal for Scottish family mottoes to appear above the crest. There are no religious implications. The crest and motto pertain to the family of Hay-MacDowal. Sir George Hay, 3<sup>rd</sup> Baronet succeeded in 1769, married Barbara MacDowal and added her name to his.

I congratulate Paul Dudley on his very nice seal-top (also on page 12). Clue no. 1 is to be found in the finial, which is a Salisbury 'Group A' casting (see my *West Country Silver Spoons*, Plate H, pages 160-1). Salisbury castings abound over a wide area and a brisk trade was done with many country goldsmiths who wanted to avoid the trouble of casting for themselves. I think this spoon is indubitably the Ellis Lot 141.

So we look for a significant town not too far from Salisbury. As to the Ellis Lot 140, which was also Lot 192 in the How sale at Woolley & Wallis on 30<sup>th</sup> October 2007, this now reposes in safe keeping! The provenance deployed in the text of Ellis Lot 140 needs to be pondered as it may have more validity than many asserted family histories. I continue to ponder, as in many other cases.

As to the 'Gloria Scott' reference, the individual depicted is of course a convict who is undergoing transportation to the penal settlement in Australia.

**Elspeth Morrison** of The Incorporation of Goldsmiths says of the attributions in the postal auction, Lots 121 & 122 (The Finial Sep/Oct '14, page 31): Henry Steuart Fothringham thinks the marks are for John Glenny, Montrose. That's the attribution we have on our database to very similar marks of 'IG' oblong & in script with the associated punches.

**Jack O'Hare** drops a line: Congratulations on bringing The Finial to its 25<sup>th</sup> Birthday. I have been fortunate to have been a member from the very start and still refer to the early editions from time to time. Terry was a lovely character and he and I always exchanged banter on telephone nights. Mary and I still keep in contact over Christmas.

**John Manasseh** responds with some feedback: I don't understand David McKinley's response to 'stub marks' (The Finial, Sep/Oct '14, page 11). Surely Mr John Pingo's comment that teaspoons were marked with 'double marks on single punches' is the perfect description of a stub. It is a stub whether struck with a hammer or used in a screw press, and I am sure it would have been used with both a hammer and press.

The easiest way to determine if spoon was marked using a press or with a hammer is if the marks are parallel with the mark side or the reverse side. When using a press the force will drive the 'stub' into the silver parallel with the base plate, which the spoon rests on, therefore the marks will be parallel reverse side, and most probably each mark will be of different depths. However if using a hammer one rests the punch on the surface and strikes with the hammer, the resultant marks being of equal depth.

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**Alan Kelsey** mentions: With reference to the picture of Arthur Birchall and Jenkin Thomas working on the 'Big Press' at Higgins in the 1930s (The Finial, Jul/Aug '14, page 8), I worked with them both at C.J. Vanders when they started spoonmaking there in 1948 and we used the old Higgins tools and dies. The big ball press had gone, we were using a friction screw press.

After the War, I was the first apprentice spoonmaker to be taken on as only Arthur and Jenkin with Stanley Sidey were left.

Arthur Birchall was an Olympic swimmer in the early games of the last century. Jenkins Thomas was an accomplished musician, first fiddle and leader of the Norwood Orchestra; he also served in the First World War in the flying corps.

I enclose a photo of me and the friction screw press at Vanders about 30 years ago. The dies and tools still exist and are still in use at the new Wakely & Wheeler workshop.
